We will figure out how to format the pictures and possibly do a better job at judging. Like everything now, we need to work a bit to figure stuff out and reduce our stress!

Maxillaria buchtienii \$40 Species - Multi growth blooming sized plants Highly fragrant flowers on 18" tall plants



Maxillaria chlorantha \$35 Species- multi growth blooming sized plants Nice 1-1/2" flowers produced a couple times a year on nice compact plants



Maxillaria cymbidioides \$35 Species- Large blooming sized plants Nice 2" flowers produced throughout the year





Maxillaria hennisiana \$35 Species - Blooming sized multi growth plants Great smaller species- 10" tall plants produce an abundance of yellow and white flowers- usually twice per year

Maxillaria luteograndiflora \$40

Species - Large multi growth blooming sized plants Larger plants that produce many 4-5" flowers that smell like honey!



Max. pseudoreichenheimiana \$35

Species- Blooming sized multi growth plants Beautiful spotted leaves produce many spidery flowers-Beautiful out of bloom!

Maxillaria rufecens \$35

Species- Blooming sized multiple growth plants 12" tall plants that produce 1-1/2" flowers that smell sweet in the vanilla range- blooms throughout the year





Maxillaria scalariformis \$35

Species - Mature blooming sized plants Unusual plants look more like Dendrobiums but produce abundant pink flowers - rare!

Maxillaria schunkeana \$30

Species- multi growth blooming sized plants Small plants that produce nearly black flower throughout the year



Maxillaria sophronitis \$30

Species - Multi growth blooming sized divisions Small creeping plants that produce bright red flowers several times per year



Maxillaria striata \$50

Species - blooming sized multi growth plants Huge 6" long lasting yellow flowers with red stripes Flowers produced both above and below foliage

Maxillaria tenuifolia \$25

Species Blooming sized multi growth divisions Nice 1-1/2" flowers that smell like coconut





Brassia pumila \$25

Species - small divisions
Rare Brassia that produces sprays of 3" flowers



(gireoudiana x Sunset Gold) Small sized division of awarded plant Massive 14" sprays of flowers twice a year





Paphiopedilum Delrosi \$45

(Rothschiladianum x delenatii) Large blooming sized plant Large 6" pink flowers- a true show stopper!



Phrag Don Wimber \$30

(Eric Young x besseae) Single growth large seedlings Great hybrid that produces large 3-4" flowers successively over several months








Phrag Eumelia Arias \$45

(kovachii x schlimii) Blooming sized multi growth plants Large 3-1/2" flowers on small plants - Great primary hybrid







Phrag Memoria Mariza Rolando \$55

(kovachii x Hanne Popow) Large blooming sized plants These also produce amazing large flowers for the size of the plants- This adds both besseae and schlimii to kovachii





Phrag Mini Grande \$50 (popowii x pearcei) Large multi growth blooming sized plants Small plants that produce 12" veined dark flowers - Each spike will produce 3-5 flowers easy blooming

Phrag pearcei \$40 Species Multi growth blooming sized plants Beautiful species that bloom successively throughout the year producing 3" flowers with twisted petals







Phrag Predator \$75

(richterii x popowii) Multi growth blooming sized

Imagine long petalled flowers well over a foot tall on plants that are only about 18" across! These will be amazing! Think of entering these in the next show with this name as well!

Phrag Peruflora Cirila Alca \$55 (kovachii x dalessandroi) Multi growth blooming sized plants Imagine multiple 4-1/2" flowers on branched spikes on more mature plants!





Phrag reticulatum \$45

Species Single growth blooming sized plants 5-6" green flowers produced sucessively


Phrag Saint Ouen \$50 (Hanne Popow x besseae) Blooming sized multi growth plants Small plants producing about 3" red to dark pink flowers





Phrag schlimii \$50

Species - Multi growth blooming sized plants Successive blooming flowers on smaller plants. Pouch is the size of a marble









Phrag Zapatilla de la Virgen \$55

(popowii x warsczewiczianum) Large multi growth blooming sized plants Two species in the caudatum group combined to produce easier to grow plants with flowers that will be about 28-30" tall!

APRIL 2020 PLANT OF THE MONTH

Cattleya walkeriana 'Kenny' AM/AOS

Grown by Ken Mettler



Ken's advice for successfully growing 'Kenny':

First of all, I'd like to mention that the 'Kenny' clone may not be pure Cattleya walkeriana. There is furious debate about this, but there is some evidence that it (and many of the white C. walkeriana) may contain some genes from Cattleya loddigesii.

C. walkeriana 'Kenny' tends to grow taller than most C. walkeriana, and frequently blooms on a growth with a leaf. Most C. walkeriana bloom on a basal growth with no leaf.

My C. walkeriana 'Kenny' grows in a wood basket with no potting mix, similar to many Vandas. It gets hung outside in bright light, bordering on full sun in the summer, and sprayed regularly with MSU fertilizer (quarter to half teaspoon per gallon) all summer long. It stays out until around Halloween. It has been down to 28F and suffered no damage, but it was very dry at this time. In the winter, it gets hung right in front of a south-facing glass door, getting as much sun as possible. It gets no fertilizer and little water (daily light misting) from November through the end of February. In March, the new growth starts to emerge, and I resume watering and fertilizing. Usually, this is a spike of two to four flowers. It blooms about three out of four years, but sometimes takes a rest. I've had it about 20 years, and it seems to like this treatment.


